

# We encourage you to report human trafficking

Emergencies such as a refugee crisis often attract individuals and groups with criminal intentions pretending to be helpful. Keep in mind that people may want to take advantage of your situation. Please pay attention to the risks of human trafficking.

## **BE AWARE**

- Never hand over your mobile, passport, or other documents to a stranger.
- Make sure that anyone who offers you support, a ride, or accommodation shows valid identification. Remember to write down their contact information.

# **REPORT A CRIME**

- If you see other people being approached by suspicious individuals or if you have been approached yourself, don't hesitate to report to the Swedish Police.
- If someone is forcing, pressuring, or manipulating you into engaging in unwanted sexual acts or prostitution, or if you think you have been subject to human trafficking of any kind, please report to the Swedish Police.
- If you have been a victim of sexual abuse, threats, or violence, please report to the Swedish Police.
- We urge you to report your experiences even if you can't identify the perpetrators.

#### **HOW TO REPORT**

- You can report by approaching police officers at border crossings, or by dialling +46 77 114 14 00 for non-emergency situations.
- If it is an emergency call 112 and ask to speak with the Police.
- You can also visit the nearest police station or talk to a representative of a nongovernmental organisation.
  Victim support staff can accompany you if you decide to report. All complaints are treated as confidential.
- The Swedish Police are trained to receive complaints of a sensitive nature.
